We did have the help of our lawyer (the best in Oklahoma), and things are now back to normal and we are again able to help these men as we have always done in the past. That means the companies who have needed these men and our help can now hire them again. We want to thank God and

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each one who helped.



We now have seven beds at the farm. with four active greenhouses, and we are working more. Each on greenhouse is 25' 60'. by One is with aquaponics greens ready to serve. One

strawberries, and another is all tomatoes. It is contracted to a genius; who hires some of our men to learn the business. We have a total of 28 greenhouses, so we will soon be growing a lot of healthy food. As time goes on, we will be raising a lot of good fish also.

We have been able to start networking with several in the Chandler area where we helped establish a quarterly meeting with likeminded individuals where we can share ideas, resources, and possible solutions for the challenges that arise.

In and around Oklahoma City, primarily through the efforts of Stephen Yanny, the park manager at our 59<sup>th</sup> street location, we have been networking for several months with a vast array of other entities who share common interests and goals. Just this week through shared efforts these groups have come together to share contacts and resources to aid Hand Up to solve a critical issue involving offender registration and parole officer supervision. These connections have proved invaluable in many situations. We have found that not only have we learned from these different groups, but Hand Up has been able to educate many of these group leaders as to how solve some of their challenges. has been successfully using for years to provide the best outcomes for our clients.

Growth is challenging, but it can also be rewarding and interesting as we learn to partner with others in the journey.

### **Testimonies**

I am from Tulsa, and I was born in 1962. I was the youngest of six children. We attended a Methodist church every Sunday, and we all sang in the choir. I went to Sunday school, but I didn't really know the Lord. I skipped church a lot, and I wasn't interested in knowing Him. My siblings and I played sports, and we won many trophies. We had a competition about who could win the most trophies. I played baseball, football, and soccer. I had ADHD, and we had a babysitter who locked me in a dark closet because she didn't know how to deal with me. My dad found another babysitter when he found out. My dad worked three iobs sometimes. He was in enforcement. My dad taught me to have a good work ethic, and I always gave 100% at every job I had. When I was five, my dad put my siblings and me in a Methodist home because he and my mom were having some problems. This was a very scary experience for a five year old boy, especially since I was separated from my siblings in the home. My parents got divorced, and both of my parents remarried. I lived with my grandparents till I was eight. That was when my dad bought a house, and I lived with him and my step-mom.

I got my first felony when I was 12, and I continued to stray from the Lord in my teen years. My step-mom was verbally and

physically abusive, and my dad let me go live with my mom and step-dad when I was 14. That was when I started using drugs. I blamed it on peer pressure, but now I realize that was only a justification. My step -dad was a truck driver who worked for a moving company, and I helped him in the summers. I didn't finish high school, but I got my GED. I got married when I was 21, and the marriage lasted six years. I have one daughter. I have done construction work and oilfield work, and I have been a mechanic. I continued to do wrong in my adult years, not caring about consequences or who I hurt. I turned my life over to the Lord once, but it didn't last. I let the flesh take over my life, and I went to prison for the first time in 1988. I have been to prison three times.

I came to know the Lord in prison. I was tired of the life I was living, so I surrendered all to the Lord. I felt peace that day. Living without the Lord in my life wasn't working, and I became a born again Christian. My last incarceration lasted 17 years. About a year before I discharged, I looked back on my life, and I realized I had wasted my life. I was 61 years old, and I wanted to do something positive with my life. A friend told me about Hand Up Ministries. He told me how the dedicated staff at Hand Up helped newly released felons with a place to stay and a chance to get back on their feet. I applied to Hand Up. and a few weeks later I received an acceptance letter from Hand Up. Hand Up Ministries was a godsend. Not only did they help me with every aspect of my life, they also gave me hope. Who does this? The staff is made up of men of God. Hand Up helps with jobs, food, transportation, clothing, ID, and everything I needed to get back on my feet.

One of our residents passed away this week we honor his time with Hand Up, and his service to our Country as a Veteran.


I was born Sugarland, Texas in 1956. I was the middle child of five siblings.

My dad worked for the county, and my mom worked for a large company. My parents got divorced in 1968, and my mom moved us to Ada, Oklahoma. My mom met my step-dad there. My step-dad and I didn't see eye to eye. We attended a Baptist church. My step-dad wanted us to go to church, and the only reason I went to church was keep peace in the family. I graduated from high school in Ada, and I returned to Texas to go to welding school.

I got job Tulsa in 1978. I worked in Tulsa for a year, and then I went to Alaska to work on an oil pipeline. I spent 11 months in Alaska. I wanted to stay in Alaska, but there was no position open with that company. I returned to Ada, where I got a job with a company which made grave monuments. I worked there for 36 years. We helped build the Murrah bombing memorial in Oklahoma City.

I got married in 1978, and I have three daughters and 11 grandchildren. My first wife died in 1989. I thought there was no reason to live, but I met a man who encouraged me to continue living. I remarried in 1996 or 1997. We were married for ten years. I committed a crime in 2004, and I spent 17 years in prison. I started attending church in prison, and I was baptized in Church of Christ in 2015. I got out of prison in 2021, and I came to Hand Up Ministries.

I got a job in July, 2021, and I have been at that same job for four months. I



have made many good friends at Hand Up, and Hand Up has given me a chance and made a big difference in my life. There is more to do than sit around the house. I have found a good church, which I attend on Sunday morning, and I like the

church service at Hand Up on Sunday night. If any brothers here want me to pray for them or help them, I am glad do that.

I was born in Talihina Indian Hospital in December of 1964. I had three older sisters, but only two are still living. My dad was shot and killed in a bar in November of 1966. We lived with my paternal grandparents about six miles west of Idabel. Oklahoma. My mother remarried, and we moved into Idabel. During my childhood and early teens, my family had its own church. It was called Water Hole Methodist Church. We had a preacher come every other Sunday, and my grandfather would preach on the other Sundays. My grandfather passed away in 1987, and our church came to an end. My grandmother went to another Indian Methodist church in the area.

I moved to Stillwater when I met my wife. Our son was born in December of 1987. We also had two daughters. We raised them the best we could. Our marriage ended in 2001. It was around this time that I was charged with a crime, and this altered my life forever. Due to the nature of my crime, life has been a struggle. I served 20 months in prison. I sent an application to Hand Up Ministries, and they gave me a home.

I have been at Hand Up for a year. I give thanks to Hand Up for giving me a place to call home. I also want to thank my Genesis One leader for giving me support.
